Academy Award-winning filmmaker premieres documentary on Landesa's Girls Project at Sundance Film Festival

SEATTLE – A new short documentary film on Landesa's Girls Project, called "After My Garden Grows," by Academy Award Winner Megan Mylan, will premiere at the Sundance Film Festival on Tuesday, January 21 at 4:30pm.

The documentary follows teenager Monika Barman, in rural West Bengal India, as she grows a garden to feed her family, earn money to pay school fees and avoid an early marriage. Monika is one of more than 40,000 girls who participate in the Girls Project, a partnership between the government of West Bengal and the non-profit Landesa. The Girls Project aims to reduce the risk of child marriage, keep poor rural girls in school and empower them socially and economically by educating them about their rights and teaching them land-based livelihood skills such as organic gardening. Currently more than 40,000 girls in 1,000 villages across West Bengal are participating. The goal is to roll out the project nationwide and reach millions of girls.

According to UNICEF, while the legal age of marriage in India is 18, the median age of marriage for rural girls is 16. Nearly half of all girls in are currently married before they reach 18. Girls who marry early are more likely to drop out of school, to suffer health problems, to live in poverty, and to experience gender-based violence. These same girls are more likely to either die in childbirth or lose their newborn infants. For more information about the project see the Girls Project page on Landesa's website.

The film will be released in India later this year through a series of film premiere events and national grassroots distribution.
